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Editorial

ecently I had the privilege of speaking at a Bible Conference in one of our congregations. To be involved in those meetings was an encouragement, not least because of the manner in which those present accepted and responded to the ministry. I think I experienced just a little of what the apostle knew at Thessalonica – a people embracing the message joyfully, and recognising it as the Word of God (1 Thessalonians 1:6, 2:13). Paul thanked God for this, and preachers are still richly blessed by hearers with such an appetite.

A few days later, I caught a little of a radio interview with an Anglican Bishop. Without the introduction, I wouldn't have known he professed Christianity – such was the disdain with which he treated the Scriptures. I suppose I shouldn't have been surprised, but sometimes hearing these "teachers" peddle their "fables" (2 Timothy 4:3-4)

so openly does shock. It is a challenge to keep on preaching and practicing the Word whatever the circumstances and however many the scoffers.

And so, as we begin 2016, we must rededicate ourselves to the task of living out the truth of God. John said, "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children walk in truth" (3 John 4). Our lives must ever be an outworking of the truth of Scripture, and of the timeless principles we find there. Today, the temptations to abandon these principles, to redefine the faith, to push back the boundaries, must be resisted. Remember the Bereans? "They received the word with all readiness of mind, and searched the Scriptures daily, whether those things were so" (Acts 17:11). And in this, they are an example to us all.

he Lord desires that His people live for the glory of his Name. We may be a small remnant, a little flock, but we are truly a holy seed renewed in the image of God in knowledge, righteousness and

holiness. By the power of His grace we are under His rule in Christ and can say, "O Lord our God, other lords beside thee have had dominion over us; but by thee only will we make mention of thy name" (Isaiah 26:13). God's children have turned from every sandy foundation and are standing on the sure foundation He has laid in Zion. "For other, foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 3:11).

BEING UNITED TO CHRIST, THE FOUNTAIN OF HOLINESS, LET US THEN GO DAILY BY FAITH TO HIM.

The believer's testimony is clear and certain, "This is my rest for ever: here will I dwell; for I have desired it" (Psalm 132:14). God's holy seed have received the Spirit of their everlasting Father according to His promise, "I will put my spirit within you, and cause you to walk in my statutes" (Ezekiel 36:27). So we travel a different way from the world. It's "the way of holiness" (Isaiah 35:8) and our identity is "the people of [his] holiness" (Isaiah 63:18). He has "purified unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works" (Titus 2:14), "hath not called [them] to uncleanness, but unto holiness" (1 Thessalonians 4:7) and "hath saved [them] and called [them] with an holy calling' (2 Timothy1:9).

Yet even the Lord's chosen ones are not without danger of defiling themselves with the sins and corruptions of the age. Alas, there is more than just the danger! "How is the gold become dim! how is the most fine gold changed!"

(Lamentations 4:1) is the cry too often descriptive of our condition. Yet the Lord exhorts us to holy living: "be ye holy; for I am holy" (1 Peter1:16).

The pattern of true holiness is Jesus Christ. He died as much for our sanctification as our justification, delivering us from the indwelling power of sin as well as its condemnatory power. Being united to Christ, the fountain of holiness, let us then go daily by faith to Him. No one can accomplish real crucifixion of the flesh in his own strength. Victory over the dominion of indwelling sin is only realized in the strength that is in Christ Jesus and in the power of His might. When eyes are not on Christ, ears are not hearing His word,

hearts are not filled with Him, sin and self don't lose their attraction. But in close fellowship and communion with the Saviour, facing the temptations of the world, the flesh and the devil, we will say with Joseph, "how can I do this great wickedness and sin against God?" (Genesis 39:9).

Remember, He set apart (sanctified) Himself for His people's sake: "And for their sakes I sanctify myself, that they also might be sanctified through the truth" (John17:19). His very own sanctification is the source and ground of ours, in our union with Him. He is the One from whom our fruit is found. This is our motive to live godly lives and make this a year of progressive holiness, so glorifying Him.

THE COVENANTERS

A VISIT TO KILMARNOCK

he nineteenth century New Laigh Kirk sits in a prominent, elevated position near to the centre of the East Ayrshire town of Kilmarnock. My visit, however, was not so much to examine this impressive, refurbished church building – it was more to do with what lay around the structure, in the kirkyard. New Laigh kirkyard has three memorials to Covenanters who died during the dark days of the seventeenth century.

The first stone stands just to the right of the church porch, as you enter from the steps rising from John Dickie Street. It bears the following inscription:

Here lie the heads of John Ross and John Shields, Who suffered at Edinburgh, December 27th 1666, And had their heads set up in Kilmarnock.

"Our persecutors mad with wrath and ire, In Edinburgh members some do be, some here; Yet instantly united they shall be, And witness 'gainst this nation's perjury."



Ross was a native of Mauchline, Ayrshire, and Shields a tenant of Titwood farm in the parish of Mearns, Renfrewshire. They were accused of being spies, found to be in possession of arms, and to be in Kilmarnock for the purpose of passing information about the King's troops – all capital offences at the time.

The second memorial, elaborately carved with images of pistols, swords and flags, and containing the words 'Solemn League and Covenant' and 'God and our Country', is found at the centre of the graveyard. It commemorates the martyrdom of John Nisbet, tried on the charge of being at the Battle of Bothwell Bridge, and executed on the

gallows at Kilmarnock
Cross on 14th April
1683. The place
of his execution is
still marked by
a stone inside the
nearby Burns Mall. His
memorial contains the
following verse:

"Come, reader, see, here pleasant Nisbet lies,

His blood doth pierce the high and lofty skies;

Kilmarnock did his latter hour perceive,

And Christ his soul to heaven did receive.

Yet bloody Torrance did his body raise

And buried into another place;

Saying 'Shall rebels lye in graves with me!

We'll bury him where evil doers be."

The third and last stone is more recent, replacing an earlier one set into the kirkyard's northern wall. The original depicted an open Bible, and the words of Psalm 44:17 and Revelation 2:19. The present

inscription identifies **Thomas** Findlay, John Cuthbertson, William Brown, Robert Anderson, and Iames Anderson, who were all brutally treated by their persecutors, and who were among 200 drowned

near the Orkney Islands after being sentenced to transportation upon capture at Bothwell in June 1679.

Reference is also made on the same memorial to John Findlay, an honest and pious man martyred at the Grassmarket, Edinburgh, in December 1682.

WHO WERE THE COVENANTERS?

Memorials to men and women 'of the Covenant' are to be found throughout Scotland – but who were these 'Covenanters'? In essence, they were those who signed the National Covenant in 1638, an affirmation of their opposition to the 'meddling' of Stuart kings in the affairs of the Church of Scotland.

Seventeenth century monarchs held to 'the Divine right of the monarch'. Not only did they claim God's mandate to be infallible rulers in civic matters. but to be sovereign in the business of the church. This was unacceptable to Scottish Presbyterians: No man, king or otherwise, could be Head of the Church - that role belonged to Christ alone. And so this issue was central to the entire Covenanting struggle. Those naturally loyal to the Stuart dynasty were thus alienated, and for fifty years (1638-88) until the arrival of Prince William of Orange, untold suffering would be the lot of these faithful souls.

King Charles I introduced Archbishop Laud's Book of Common Prayer to

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STRUGGLE.

Opposition was immediate, and when the King declared that refusal comply was treason, the battle lines were drawn. Severe repression followed. Ministers were 'outed' from their

pulpits and banished from their parishes. Many continued to preach at open air conventicles, or in barns and private houses. This became a capital offence. Citizens failing to attend their local church – now in the charge of Episcopalian 'curates' – could be fined and interrogated by torturous methods. Failure to take the oath of loyalty to King Charles, recognising him as head of the church, might well result in summary execution by blood-thirsty dragoons scouring the country for 'rebels'.

Scotland

Persecutions became more frequent during the 'Killing Times' that followed the restoration of Charles II in 1660. An army of 6000 Highlanders, altogether unsympathetic to the Presbyterian Lowlanders, was raised by the government in 1678. These 'soldiers' swept through the West and South of Scotland, looting and plundering, and quartering themselves on the already impoverished Covenanters.

These, then, were the Covenanters – brave souls who would not bow the knee to those who sought to usurp the Crown Rights of their one true Sovereign, even Jesus Christ, no matter the cost! The bard of Scotland, Robert Burns, pays this tribute:

The Solemn League and Covenant Brings now a smile, now brings a tear; But sacred freedom, too, was theirs: If thou'rt a slave, indulge thy sneer.


Did he really say it? And if he did, what did he mean? We refer to the controversy occasioned by one of Pope Francis's homilies during his autumn visit to the USA. This is how it was reported: "The cross shows us a different way of measuring success. Ours is to plant the seeds. God sees to the fruits of our labours. And if at times our efforts and works seem to fail and not produce fruit, we need to remember that we are followers of Jesus Christ and his life, humanly speaking, ended in failure, the failure of the cross" (Emphasis added). Roman Catholic apologists have been quick to highlight the words "humanly speaking" – after all, did not His own disciples view it so, forsaking Him and fleeing, with no real expectation of a victorious resurrection?

In truth, it matters not what Pope Francis actually meant that day in St Patrick's Cathedral, New York. The fact is, the Roman Catholic Church, by its teaching and practice, deems the cross work of Christ a failure! Why else would we have the blasphemous dogma of transubstantiation, a plethora of man-made 'sacraments', an endless round of penances and indulgences, the fantasy known as purgatory, et al – why, if the cross was sufficient to atone for sin?

Rev Gary Goodes demonstrates that the cross was no failure...

Christ a failure, as the Pope says, or was it His greatest victory? "We preach Christ crucified, unto the Jews a stumbling block, and unto the Greeks foolishness; But unto them which are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God, and the wisdom of God." (1 Corinthians 1:23)

Today many people look at Calvary and all they see is a man dying on a cross. They can't understand why Christians are thrilled about the cross, why they want to sing about blood and death. The cross is just a stumbling block, as it was to the Jews in Paul's day. Unenlightened Jewish minds couldn't understand why the Messiah had to die. And the Greeks wanted something only proud intellectuals could understand – not a simple message accessible to anyone. That's why they tripped over the teaching of the cross.



But Calvary is God's masterpiece. It was no failure; it was the victory of Christ. "Thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." (1 Corinthians 15:57)

SUBSTITUTION EFFECTED

The death of Jesus Christ was no failure, because He died as our Substitute. "But we see Jesus, who was made a little lower than the angels for the suffering of death, crowned with glory and honour; that he by the grace of God should taste death for every man." (Hebrews 2:9) Note the phrase, "the suffering of death." His was not an easy passage from this world. It was excruciating agony and torture of the worst kind, for it was on a cross. He experienced all the pain, all the loneliness, and all the torments, that have ever been associated with death. Yet the wonder of it is that He did it voluntarily, so that He would receive what we deserved for our sins. That is what the Bible means when it says, "Christ died for our sins." (1Corinthians 15:3)

The death He tasted was the penalty of our sin. He endured all that the devil could throw at Him. But more than that, He bore God's wrath over sin. On that cross, the Lord absorbed the full penalty of sin. If we were to suffer hell for all eternity, we would never pay the full price. But He gathered up an eternity of punishment, paid it all, and emerged as the risen and victorious Saviour. That is power! In every possible dimension, Jesus Christ took the pain and agony of death, and tasted it all for us.

Remember that He was without sin. He was guilty of nothing. He never sinned. He could have escaped death, but He chose to die as our substitute, bearing our sin. The sinless One took upon Himself the sin of all those who would trust Him. He paid the price of our sin and secured redemption for us.

SALVATION PURCHASED

"For it became him, for whom are all things, and by whom are all things, in bringing many sons unto glory, to make the captain of their salvation perfect through sufferings." (Hebrews 2:10) The word "captain" can be translated 'author' or 'pioneer.' It means that Christ was the first and only initiator of salvation. There is no way to get to God apart from Him. Christ said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." (John 14:6 cf Acts 4:12)

Similarly, we read in Hebrews 5:8,9 "Though he were a Son, yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered; And being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him." The suffering was essential. His sufferings made Him the perfect captain. His death opened up the way so that He could bring "many sons unto glory."

Our salvation was purchased by the precious blood of Christ. (1Peter 1:18-20) Peter's words show us that God, in the counsels of eternity past, had

already planned out Calvary. Before man had even sinned, before the world was even created, God had planned Calvary. Revelation13:8 declares that Christ is "the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world."

SATAN DEFEATED

The first prophecy ever given about the Lord Jesus Christ, Genesis 3:15, predicted that He would crush the serpent's head. Hebrews 2:14 announces the fulfilment of the ancient prophecy. Satan's great power is death. He is the paymaster for the wages of sin. If he can keep a person living in sin until death, then he's got that person for ever! Christ conquered death to destroy the devil. He came out of the grave, and announced, "Because I live, ye shall live also." (John 14:9) "O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?" (1Corinthians 15:55)

SAINTS VICTORIOUS

Christ's saving work means that every born again, blood washed believer is now standing on victory ground, knowing the assurance of eternal salvation, and looking forward to that great day when the Lord shall return in glory and power! A day is coming when, "the bright and morning star" (Revelation 22:16) shall appear. That will be the hour of the Christian's triumph, and the consummation of his redemption and salvation. He shall be changed, in a moment. (See 1 Corinthians 15:52-55 cf 1 Thessalonians 4:15-18)

Today, the storm clouds gather. Delusion sweeps the earth. But for God's people the morning of an eternal day will dawn. Why? Because Christ did not fail in life or in death!

"O victory in Jesus,
My Saviour, forever.
He sought me and bought me
With His redeeming blood;
He loved me ere I knew Him
And all my love is due Him,
He plunged me to victory,
Beneath the cleansing flood."

CHOSEN NOT FOR GOOD

simple search of words like 'elect' or 'chosen' in an appropriate programme will show you how prevalent the concept is in the Bible. One writer states: 'No other doctrine has been so central in theology and so ignored in the pulpit.' It is looked upon with fear and suspicion, a doctrine that might belong in a Bible college but not in the mind of the regular Christian.

Such thinking doesn't equate with an honest reading of the Scriptures. The Lord Himself spoke on the topic to His hearers: "For many are called, but few are chosen." (Matthew 22:14) Paul deals with the matter many times: "According as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world" (Ephesians 1:4).

The issue at stake is not 'if' there is election, but rather 'why?' Why did God choose to save some out of humanity – all of whom deserved His wrath and condemnation? In the simplest terms, the God of heaven chose to save some because He chose to save them. Paul says it was out of God's "good pleasure" (Ephesians 1:5). Christ revealed to us that it was because it was "good" in God's sight (Matthew 11:26). The election of sinners to salvation occurs before the foundation of the world (Ephesians 1:4), before men did 'good or evil' (Romans 9:11), in the free and unconstrained will of God, and all for His glory (Ephesians 1:6, 11). In view of the depth of our sin and the evil of our rebellion, it is not a marvel that God chose some, but that He chose any!

Some may wonder, 'Am I elect?' Paul shows us that this can be discerned. Yet none knows his election until he responds to the Gospel, for Paul knew this of the Thessalonians only because the "gospel came not unto [them] in word only, but also in power, and in the Holy Ghost, and in much assurance"

(1Thessalonians 1:4-5). Young person, it is not your duty to figure out if you are elect or not: your duty is to repent and believe the gospel. Such faith arises in those chosen of God. Our election is not earned. God does not choose us because we were lovely but because He loved us. In humility and gratitude, we sing with the hymn writer: "Tis not that I did choose Thee, For, Lord, that could not be; This heart would still refuse Thee, hadst Thou not chosen me."

his year, in the middle pages, we plan, God willing, to cover some of the major religious ideas that young people will encounter in school, university and in the workplace.

Knowing what others believe helps us to present the Gospel to them effectively. The truth of the gospel never changes, but how we approach others will vary according to what they believe.

By way of introduction, we need to think first about the issue of defending our faith.

WE ARE SEEKING TO WIN SOULS, NOT JUST ARGUMENTS!



he idea of respect has taken on a very particular flavour in our present culture. It may be described by the cliché 'Live and let live.' In essence, we are all supposedly given the freedom to believe what we want, and to practise our religion as we please. However, the Bible presents a religion that makes such a position impossible. While we would not use legal force to impose our religion on any, we must affirm that all religions are not equally valid.

The Bible claims exclusive truth and declares that there is only one way to God. "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." (Acts 4:12) That such a message was preached is a reflection of the teaching the apostles received from the Saviour for He said: "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." (John 14:6) Jesus Christ is the only way to God. He alone is absolute truth, and real life is only found in Him. Such exclusive claims mean that no other way to God is true. Hence the Christian will



Understanding this exclusive Gospel should not make us arrogant. We only know the truth by the gracious revelation of God. It is the Father who has revealed the truth unto babes (Matthew 11:25). Natural man cannot grasp spiritual truths (1 Corinthians 2:14), but, with Paul, we say, "God hath revealed them unto us by his Spirit" (1Corinthians 2:10). Arrogance should find no place in the Christian who knows all the spiritual knowledge he has is by the grace of God. However, such gracious privilege places us under responsibility to communicate the message to others. When we see our friends and neighbours in the darkness of false religion, we ought to lament their condition and fear for the eternal well-being of their souls. If their way to God is not His way then it is no way at all. Only the saved have eternal hope. Peter states that only those 'begotten again' have a 'lively' hope of "an inheritance incorruptible, and undefiled, and that fadeth not away, reserved in heaven for you" (1Peter 1:4). If we have any heart for lost souls, we must surely desire that they would come to know hope in Christ alone.

Later in his first epistle, Peter exhorts all believers to "sanctify the Lord God in your hearts: and be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear." (1Peter 3:15) Some deny our right to have an eternal hope; others genuinely want to know how to have what we have. Whatever the reason for the enquiry, it is our joyful task to give an answer. The word "answer" is from where we get our word 'apology'. When we think of an apology we think of saying sorry for something we shouldn't have done. But the Greek 'apologia' has nothing to do with regret or repentance. The Christian is never 'sorry' for his faith, but must always be ready to give this humble apology. The apology in view here most likely comes from the practice in Athens of every man being obligated to present his own defence if he were brought to trial. In the days before expensive lawyers, citizens would have to frame their own defence. Peter is saying that if we are put on trial for our faith, actually or metaphorically, we should be ready to present a coherent defence of what we believe and why we believe it. Such a defence must come from those who have a consistent walk and a good conscience before God (1 Peter 3:17). This defence should be:

We should be able to defend the reliability of the Scriptures as the inerrant, inspired Word of God. We ought to know the Bible's teaching regarding the person of Christ, very God and very man, hence the only suitable Mediator and Saviour of sinners. We ought to be

able to define and defend the nature of

the atonement – what did our Saviour accomplish when He gave His life a ransom for many? We ought to give ourselves to the careful study of the Scriptures in order that we may be "ready".

REASONABLE

By this I mean that our defence should make sense. The Christian message is consistent and rational. What we believe is based on historical fact. The resurrection of Christ as described in the Gospels can only be understood to mean that He, who was dead, actually rose from the dead. These miraculous and supernatural events transcend our reason, but nothing in the Gospel is contradictory. Sin leaves us guilty before God. For guilt to be removed the price of sin must be paid in full. On the cross the sinless Christ could not have died for His own sins. He died for the sins of others, paying the price in full. Hence the guilty can be pardoned. Rational truth is presented in the Bible, and we should be able to communicate it clearly and concisely.

RESOLUTE

WE ARE PRESENTING

We are not apologising for what we believe. We are presenting Divine truth. Therefore our presentation must be made with resolution and confidence. This is the only worthy way to present Christ.

RESPECTFUL

Peter tells us that we are to answer in "meekness and fear". The sense is that our defence should be presented kindly and respectfully, without contention and contempt. When disagree with others over their religious persuasion, we can be inclined

to want to win the argument. Peter warns us of such. We need to keep in mind we are seeking to win souls, not just arguments!

We who have been graciously brought to know the truth, the only truth, have now the solemn and joyful task of defending that truth in the midst of many onslaughts. May God help us!

example. But some little things don't thrill me; insects such as flies and earwigs come to mind! In James 3:5 we are told, "Even so the tongue is a little member, and boasteth great things. Behold how great a matter a little fire kindleth!" The tongue, although small, need not be bad. Our tongues were designed to praise the Lord, but sadly we use them often to complain, criticise and gossip. James compares our speech to a fire. How lovely on a winter's night to light the fire and watch the flames spring to life and feel the warmth in the

room! However, let a spark fall from an unguarded fire and a home and lives are at risk of destruction. Likewise our words can be comforting and warming, or unguarded and destructive.

GRACE, SEASONED Elkanah had two wives, Hannah WITH SALT and Penninah (1 Samuel 1:2). Not an ideal situation to start with, but greatly aggravated by Penninah's attitude towards Hannah. Hannah's childlessness was a grief to her, but she had to endure also the taunts of Penninah. The burden became unbearable and thankfully Hannah took it all to the Lord. Undoubtedly Penninah suffered as a second wife - Elkanah loved Hannah, and while generous to Penninah, Hannah was treated even more generously. Jealousy stirred Penninah to say cruel things to Hannah. Jealousy is often at the root of cruel words and actions. Potiphar's wife could not seduce Joseph, so she made a false accusation against him. Jealousy is a form of coveting. The words that come from a jealous heart are sparks that burn and are in danger of causing much hurt and harm. We have all been hurt by insensitive words. Let us guard against using them.

It is great to have news to share. In the parable, the woman who had lost a piece of silver was quick to share the joy of finding it with her friends and neighbours, (Luke 15:9). However there is always a danger of sharing news which should not be told, or passing on detail that is biased or untrue. The story is told of a message sent through the trenches in the Great War. The original message was, "Send reinforcements, we're going to advance". However the message received was, "Send three and four pence we're going to a dance"! Many a message does not end as it started out. Thoughts and opinions are not facts. When we gossip we are on dangerous ground. Proverbs 16:28 warns that, "a whisperer separateth chief

friends." Mary "supposed" the Lord Jesus to be the gardener (John 20:15).

What joy she experienced when He spoke to her and she realised her mistake! It is very easy to suppose things. A half-truth is a whole lie. With David we might pray, "Set a watch, O LORD, before my mouth; keep the door of my lips." (Psalm 141:3)

The exhortation in Philippians 4:8 could be applied to not only our thoughts but also to our speech, "Whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things."

In poetic language, "A word fitly spoken is **like** apples of gold in pictures of silver." (Proverbs 25:11) If we resolve anything this year, may it be that our speech "be alway with grace, seasoned with salt" (Colossians 4:6).

CONGREGATION CALL: NEWTOWNARDS

"Them that honour me, I will honour" (1 Samuel 2:30). This text, displayed on the wall behind the pulpit, summarises the history of the congregation in Newtownards. It owes its commencement and continuation to faithful men and women, those with the desire that the Lord would be honoured in this area. God has been pleased to bless their labours for Him.

The well-loved passage in Hebrews 11 has often been termed the 'Hall of Fame' or 'Roll of Honour' of men and women of faith. Not so well known is that list of diligent workers in Nehemiah 3. Here is the story of how God's people became burdened for His honour, and with diligence, and in spite of opposition, came together to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem. The parallel with the establishment and extension of the testimony in Newtownards is clear. There were, and still are, those in this place concerned for the glory of God. They are determined to see the walls of separation rebuilt and maintained. It would be impossible to mention all who have contributed, but "God is not unrighteous to forget your work and labour of love, which ye have shewed toward His name." (Hebrews 6:10) We can be sure that no one will be omitted from that Book of Remembrance being written in Heaven! (Malachi 3:16)

The witness in Newtownards commenced in 1971. A number of Christians who were attending the Martyrs Memorial Church were approached and meetings were commenced in May, firstly in the Red Cross Hall, and then in the Orange Hall. The congregation was constituted on Lord's Day November 21st, 1971, Dr Paisley preaching. Student minister Mr Alex Chambers served the congregation for three years. Rev Trevor Baxter was then placed as student minister and under his ministry the work began to grow. The need for a permanent presence in the town was met when ground was purchased on the Bangor Road.

A temporary building was

erected in May 1977.

The first ordained minister was Rev Alan Dunlop, who was installed in September 1981. Under his ministry souls were saved and the present church building was opened in November 1984.

Rev Fred Greenfield became minister in October 2001 and faithfully served the congregation until early 2007. The current minister, Dr Ron Johnstone, was installed in May 2008.

In recent years the congregation felt the need



The complex was opened on August 31st 2012 costing approximately £500,000. At the close of the opening service, Dr Johnstone announced to the congregation that the offering had amounted to £52, 285, making a total of £73, 674 received that month! The service closed with the singing of the very appropriate hymn, 'To God be the Glory.'

Due to the generosity of members no bank interest was paid. After two years, when the debt was almost paid off, renovations were carried out to the front of the main building costing over £100,000. The facilities in the extension have proved to be a great blessing to the work of the congregation. We are still humbled and amazed at the goodness of God and the generosity of God's people in an age of austerity.

As in other Free Presbyterian buildings, the symbol of the Burning Bush is prominently displayed. It is a challenge and constant reminder to members of their responsibilities. At the opening of the complex, Dr Johnstone spoke on the significant lessons of the Bush that burned and was not consumed. It was there Moses was given a vision of the glory of God, the guilt of man and the grace of Christ.

Such a vision was what had motivated the congregation to unite under God to erect the complex, the reason it exists as a congregation, and the ministry it is to carry out in all its endeavours. Mr Johnstone then highlighted that the Preservation of Scripture was a similar miracle to that of the Burning Bush in that while the flames of criticism had been directed against the Bible, it was not consumed. The Passion of the Saviour on Calvary was a miracle

And the Punishment of the Sinner in eternity will be a miracle for the same God who preserved that Bush from being consumed is able to preserve the risen body of the unbeliever in eternal fire.

For these reasons, he said, we must continue to determine that all the sermons preached would come from Scripture, centre on the Saviour, and therefore would be a means of bringing comfort to the saint and conviction to the sinner.

By God's grace, this congregation has an abiding desire not only to be challenged by the lessons from the Burning Bush, but to fulfil the motto on the Newtownards crest and be 'Strong and Faithful' for the Lord in this age of apostasy.

RUGBY WORLD CUP OUTREACH

ANGEL IN ALCORCON



his last year we have seen the membership increased in a way I haven't seen in all the years I have known the Alcorcon congregation. Among those who became members are an elderly couple, a family of three children, another family with two grown children and their grandmother. Another family that left some five years ago is back with renewed zeal for the things of God. And lately we have had another very faithful older couple attending, and they are very much at home with us. Last week we interviewed a young woman who has a little baby. After going through a series of studies on discipleship, she came to Christ, and she wants to be baptised. I mustn't forget

another woman, who just left last week to go to Ulster to be with her husband; both are from here. She testified that the Lord has saved her these last days before leaving. We've tried to keep faithful in the preaching of His Word, and He has blessed. This is His work and to Him is all the glory.

One important thing for us as a family: We needed to be closer to Alcorcon so I could develop my ministry, so we moved from Toledo to Madrid. We are now 12 minutes away, not 50. Soon I begin a series on discipleship with an exJehovah's Witness who attends our services. We will focus on the Trinity, salvation and church life.

I continue to be fully involved with the young people. Though the numbers are small, we trust the Lord will increase this area of the ministry. Our evening services are as large as the morning services used to be, and the church is now to full capacity and beyond in the morning services. I will tell you more next spring as I will be in Ulster for deputation meetings. Pray about this, and for the church in Alcorcon and our ministry here.

CARLOS CORALLES CALLED

arried with two children, Sebastian (22), and Laura (17), Carlos arrived in Spain from Columbia in December 2000. A converted Roman Catholic, he set himself to join a Bible-believing church. This brought him to Alcorcon. Here he discovered the doctrines of grace and the importance of faithful preaching, reverent worship, and the sufficiency of Scripture.

In 2001, he studied Church History and Homiletics in Grace Bible College. Carlos was duly ordained to the eldership in Alcorcon, and has preached in various churches. Now God has called him to the ministry. His call was sealed through a message preached by Mission Board Chairman, Rev Harris. He will start his training this month.

The son of a single mother, Carlos spent his childhood with grandparents until his grandmother died. He went to live with his mother's sister's family. He did not have contact with his mother again until after his conversion. His best childhood memory is of his grandmother, a devout Roman Catholic, reading the Bible. Obviously, this was a strange providence, but it left an immense impression on him. Teenage years were particularly difficult. In the 1980's drug gangs were

rampant in his city. Carlos became involved in crime, and at 15 years old left his aunt's house to 'live it up!' When 18 he suffered a bullet wound in his leg and was conscripted into the army. He enjoyed military life and served in a unit against guerrilla forces.

Three months after joining the Army, there was a military ceremony and every soldier was given a New Testament by the Gideons. This he read, and here his conversion story begins – alone in the Andes mountains, reading the Psalms his grandmother had read to him as a child.



Carlos left the army, married his girlfriend and they had their first child. Most of his former friends in crime were either dead or in prison. After the untimely murder of his 15-year-old cousin, he turned to alcohol, yet continued to read the Bible. In time, through faithful preaching,

he was led to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ.


